YOUTH SERVICE MONTH

Dear District Governors and Rotary friends,

May is “Youth Service Month” and that just might give us cause to put a little extra thought into the things we can do for our youth. I’ve always believed that many of our actions should be driven towards getting our young people ready to effectively manage the legacy we leave them – and that legacy is our world. The things we do should be delivering our youth with excellence in health, education, vocational skills and above all else, the attitude to want to make a difference for the better. That’s one of our more important responsibilities.

The Atlanta Convention is shaping up to be a tremendous event with something like 43,000 already registered. Earlier this month we had 1,363 for The Philippines registered along with 362 from Australia and 84 from New Zealand. Make sure you call into the Rotary Resource Centre in the House of Friendship and maybe meet some of the people you’ve only heard about.

Membership numbers are looking reasonably good with good growth in The Philippines (7 extra clubs and 2,619 extra Rotarians), while Australian has five less clubs but 139 more Rotarians. New Zealand is steady on clubs and has 14 extra Rotarians.

TRF contributions are impressive and a big month from Australian clubs in April has boosted their result. The Philippines and Indonesia continue to shine and New Zealand is solid. Interesting to note that TRF Trustees made a decision to charge the cost of any open 3H or Matching Grant not closed by 31st August 2017 to the district’s DDF and then close it. That should create a bit of action. The three Per Capita Cups are reaching the usual stage of excitement as the table indicates, but I’m not putting my money on anyone at this stage.

We are yet again in the final stages of another year. Time to review our membership listing and get them 100% correct because you’ll be charged (and have to pay) for whatever sits on your books at June 30th regardless of the true numbers. It makes sense to get it right now. Contributions to The Rotary Foundation need to pick up in Australia and the last month surge we normally experience needs to happen. Governors should be working with District Foundation Chairs to make sure no stone is left unturned.

Thanks for your support this year and good luck over those final weeks.

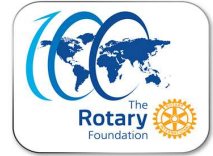

THE PAUL HARRIS SOCIETY

Within our region we now have over 1,000 Paul Harris Society members. Given that this recognition program became an official Foundation Program just over four years ago, the uptake by Rotarians has been outstanding. The program is a District driven program with a Paul Harris Society Chair in each District and this Chair is part of the Foundation committee in the district. While not all district chairs are formally recorded in the RI system, all districts are engaged in strong promotional activities that bring positive outcomes.

However, for the Paul Harris Society Chair to be able to do their job and have access to the reports they need, they must be registered in that position in My Rotary.

Membership is a commitment to give at the USD1,000 level for as long as the member is able. It was certainly not a demand for payment but simply a reminder. Many have found this a positive move and were appreciative of the advice.

As the year comes to close, we send thanks to all those that have become part of making our Paul Harris Society so strong, and to all those that have stepped up and taken on District responsibilities to ensure The Rotary Foundation remains our charity of choice.

Friendly Administration Reminders

From your Club and District Support Team

Current Club Officers:

- ◆ Report your incoming club officers in My Rotary or ClubRunner (if applicable) to ensure they can access the tools they need to perform their duties in the coming year.
- ◆ Update your membership list in My Rotary or ClubRunner (if applicable) so that you will receive an accurate 1 July invoice.
- ◆ Report new members or terminating members to *Rotary Down Under* (Australia, New Zealand districts) or *Philippines Rotary Magazine* (Philippines districts) if they wish to receive it or want to stop it. If new members want *The Rotarian* (print or digital) send an email to data@rotary.org. Remember that subscription to a magazine (either *RDU*, *PRM* or *The Rotarian*) is compulsory.
- ◆ See how your club is going with regards to the Presidential Citation. Go to the Presidential Citation dashboard in My Rotary and see what activities you have left to achieve. You have until 30 June to achieve the citation. Go to: My Rotary>Manage>(Club & District Administration)>Reports>(Club Reports)>(Awards)>Presidential Citation

Incoming Club Officers:

- ◆ Make sure that your current club officers have reported your role in My Rotary or ClubRunner (if applicable)
- ◆ Register for My Rotary and explore all the various tools, if you haven't already
- ◆ Think about your goals for the coming year and enter them in Rotary Club Central

District Governors Elect:

- ◆ Make sure that all your district committee appointments and AGs have been reported in My Rotary
- ◆ Make sure that all your incoming club officers have been reported to RI. You can run reports of reported and unreported incoming club officers in My Rotary
- ◆ If you are part of the DG funding test, make sure to revise the materials on the on-line course and have the necessary discussions with your district finance team

District Governors:

- ◆ Complete your DG expense report. You have until 31 July but you can submit at any time prior. If you need a copy of the expense report, guide or other resource materials please contact your Club and District Support team
- ◆ Finalise your club ratings in Rotary Club Central by 1 June
- ◆ Remember that you must select your DG for 2019-2020 by 30 June and submit a copy of the data form to your Club and District Support team. Please also send a high quality photo of your selection and a separate one of their partner or spouse if applicable
- ◆ Make sure that your club officers have reported their incoming club officers to RI
- ◆ Select your district's 2017-2020 Council representative and alternate representative and decide if your district will submit a resolution to the 2017 Council on Resolutions.

ANNUAL FUND ON TRACK FOR NEW RECORD

With just two month remaining in the Financial 2017 Year, the signs are good for a record breaking result in all areas of giving and it's particularly pleasing to see the strong Annual Fund numbers. Our contributions over May and June last year brought in around \$2.5 million to the Annual Fund and if we can push that along a little to come up with an additional \$3 million, we'll finish the year just on \$9 million – easily beating the previous best of \$7.4 million. A fantastic way to celebrate the Centenary year. Details by country are:

Philippines – Will probably be the biggest dollar contributor in our region this year although the Aussies will be pushing hard to make sure they stay on top. All districts are performing beautifully with district 3830, 3820 and 3800 leading the dollar chase. Fantastic efforts from districts 3870, 3770 and 3860 and don't write district 3810 off just yet!

Australia – A strong month in April has brought the country up to a growth of 4.1% but still too many clubs behind last year's mark. Things can change rapidly here but now is a good time to start the club-by-club analysis. Top efforts from districts 9600, 9790, 9675 and 9820 and steady work from district 9455. Almost \$2 million behind The Philippines so it will have to be good!

Indonesia – District 3420 is leading the dollar race but 3410 has a better growth percentage. Great effort from both districts who are combining to give the country a 94% growth. Nice way to go!

New Zealand – A strong April sees the country up 13% on last YTD number and districts 9910 and 9930 are leading the way. The dollars being generated from district 9980 are pretty awesome as well so we'll see a great result from New Zealand this year. Big moves still to come from the other three districts.

PER CAPITA CUPS CREATING EXCITEMENT!

Plenty of action going on with this one and the results over the next two months will be very telling indeed. We have a runaway leader in the Philippines but being chased very hard by two other top-performing districts; Australia also has a district well out in front but we know how sneaky some of the Australian districts are when it comes to winning this one so anything could happen; and New Zealand looks like it has a sure thing in front but the four district doing ‘not much’ at this stage have a habit of jumping up strongly at the end of the year.

Australia – They have a clear cut leader with district 9600 leading the way on \$136.86 but there are five other districts just sitting there waiting for the right time to strike. We all know district 9810 will be planning and plotting, and district 9800 has their big dinner on May 31st (other Victorian districts will be part of that). District 9685 never lies down without a fight and 9675 is having a top year. But is that enough to knock the leader off the top spot? I’m not sure about any of that but I do know that there are far too many districts below \$50 with just two months to go.

Philippines – District 3830 is well and truly leading at this stage but is it enough? The two districts below them are far from finished and as another Arch Klumph Society member would add something like \$83 dollars to the Per Capita figure, everyone (especially 3820 and 3800) is looking very hard indeed. Exciting finish to this one!

New Zealand – Just two districts look like they have a chance at this stage but you’d be a little bit crazy to ignore any of the other four. These guys have a habit of sneaking up and jumping on you, just like their rugby team (although I wouldn’t call it sneaking up with those guys). I just have this feeling that a storm is about to break out over the next six weeks and we’ll see some massive changes to the table. Maybe not in May but certainly in June!

POLIO CASH NEEDS ATTENTION!

If we look at the bottom line you'd think we're doing OK when it comes to polio. We have an overall increase of 12% (around \$100,000) but if you look at the shortfall in both New Zealand and Australia you'll see why the alarm bells are ringing. The shortfalls are certainly recoverable but they shouldn't be there at all as we approach this most critical stage of our 32-year battle.

Still just five cases this year to date and nothing since February. We are now entering the danger period in the northern hemisphere and funds are desperately needed to help get the job done. We simply have to keep a strong vaccinating program going and that requires money – lots and lots of money.

The Philippine Rotarians have done a magnificent job this year as their contribution growth of 155% indicates. So too in Indonesia, where an 80% growth is playing its part. These are great numbers from districts that have also exploded contributions to the Annual Fund so they both have the board covered.

In Australia we have nine district behind YTD last year and some are badly down. District 9685 is a good example of what a bit of imagination can produce. As reported last month, they offered to transfer US\$2,650 from DDF to polio if a club would do likewise and this meant that with a World Fund match on the DDF, and the Bill and Melinda Gates match on the lot, the US\$2,650 the club puts in results in another US\$19,875 going into the polio war-chest. The district was 27% behind when they started this program and now they are 160% up.

Needless to say, it's not too late to do something similar in all districts but if that proves to be too much work in such a short space of time (and it might be), why not look at the remaining DDF available to the district and consider contributing some of that to polio? We can send you the form if you need one.

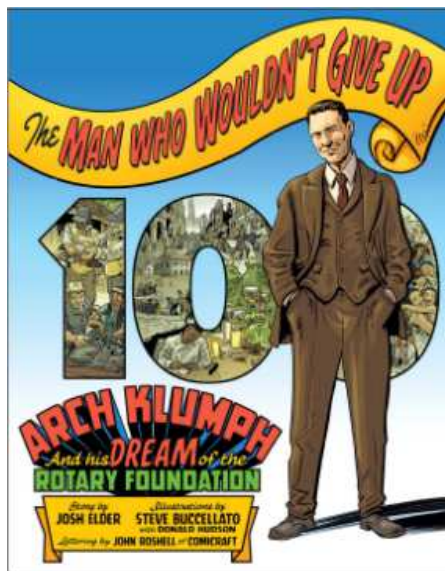
